# **Adult Small Group Discussion Guide 4-11-25**

Based on Ken's sermon "Ancient Faith: The Incarnation, Part 2"

### **INTRODUCTION (10 minutes)**

- Welcome everyone and open in prayer
- Ask: "What stood out to you most from Ken's sermon on the incarnation?"
- Read Philippians 2:5-11 together as the foundation for our discussion

### **UNDERSTANDING THE INCARNATION (15 minutes)**

#### **Discussion Questions:**

- 1. In your own words, what does "incarnation" mean and why is it so central to Christian faith?
- 2. Ken emphasized that the incarnation was not just about Jesus' miraculous birth, but about God choosing to become human. How does this reshape your understanding of God's character?
- 3. What aspect of Jesus' incarnation (emptying himself, becoming a servant, humbling himself to death) challenges you the most?

### LIVING INCARNATIONALLY (20 minutes)

#### **Discussion Questions:**

- 4. Ken stated: "We are commanded not only to believe in Jesus, we are commanded to live like Jesus." What's the difference between believing in the incarnation and living incarnationally?
- 5. The sermon contrasted worldly values with incarnational values:
  - Being yourself vs. emptying yourself
  - Looking out for yourself vs. looking out for others
  - Accumulating things vs. giving things away
  - Pursuing happiness/comfort vs. embracing sacrifice

Which of these contrasts resonates most with you right now? Why?

6. Ken drew a parallel between mothers' sacrificial love and Christ's incarnational example. Share about someone in your life who has modeled this kind of selfless love for you.

### **PERSONAL APPLICATION (25 minutes)**

#### **Discussion Questions:**

- 7. What specific area of your life do you find it most difficult to "empty yourself" for the sake of others? What makes this challenging?
- 8. What might an "incarnational approach" look like in your:
  - Family relationships?
  - Workplace?
  - Neighborhood?
  - Church community?
- 9. Ken mentioned that God will reward those who live incarnationally. How does Mark 10:29-30 influence your willingness to sacrifice for others?

### **SMALL GROUP RESPONSE (15 minutes)**

#### **Discussion Questions:**

- 10. How can our small group collectively practice more incarnational living in our community? What specific needs could we address by "emptying ourselves"?
- 11. What fears or hesitations do we have about fully embracing an incarnational lifestyle as a group?
- 12. What is one practical step we could take together in the next month to follow Jesus' example of humility and service?

### **CLOSING (5 minutes)**

- Ask each person to share one specific way they plan to live more incarnationally this week
- Close in prayer, asking God for the strength to follow Christ's example of emptying ourselves for others
